Despite these dramatic policy changes, the PS remains committed to supporting our community and advancing the science of paleontology through research, education, and advocacy. We affirm that one of our strengths as a Society is our diverse membership, and that such diversity is integral to the advancement of our Society, and to the continued rigor and ingenuity of paleontological research. We will continue to foster an environment that encourages the free expression and exchange of scientific ideas. Please note that the PS offers an emergency fund for members who are experiencing a financial emergency, if that is helpful.

The PS and our Governmental Affairs Committee (GAC) are working with peer societies and government organizations to advocate strongly on behalf of science, scientists, and scientific funding.
